Brochures & information given out to first time visitors to the FAO, or landowners dealing with Oil & Gas Companies for the first time. "Landowner's Information Guide", and "Understanding the System", "NEB Landowners' Guide to Land Agreements" & "FAO Landowners' Handbook" are most often given out.

Explained rights and gave out information about pipelines/flow lines and NEB pipelines - jurisdiction, compensation & rights pertaining to abandonment.

Explained rights to landowners who have received notification that oil & gas activity is planned on adjacent property.

Explained rights to landowners who have received correspondence from companies seeking permission to survey or to conduct geophysical activity on their land.

Discussed remedies with landowners who have not received lease rent payments from Oil and Gas Company when due. Also, advised landowners of funding available for specific overdue lease payments, and assisted with paperwork as required.

F. RECOMMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO THE PROGRAM

Section F is a separate document provided to the Management Committee at the option of the Service Provider and is not required as part of the Quarterly Report.

During this reporting period no surface lease, rent review or ROW documents were available to download from the SRB.

Landowners continue to be frustrated by the lack of access to leases and ROW documents. In the 16 months since the regulation was established allowing the SRB to publish surface lease information online, there are **still** only 16 redacted documents on the SRB website available for the public to view.

From conversations with the OGC, the FAO learned that the Orphan Site Fund will now be used to pay landowners rent payments that are in default by bankrupt oil and gas companies. There are however, numerous landowners that are not receiving their annual rent, but the oil and gas company has not completed (or in some cases not even started) the bankruptcy process. Even though landowners go through the SRB process to get a Board Order issued demanding the oil and gas company pay, many of these companies do not pay. This leaves landowners waiting until the company goes through the bankruptcy process to receive compensation . The FAO believes that this is wrong, and that landowners who are not getting paid the rent due to them should be eligible for compensation immediately, and not have to wait for the oil and gas company to go through the bankruptcy process.

OVERVIEW OF MEDIATIONS & ARBITRATIONS

SRB MEDIATIONS:

• The FAO provided assistance to 7 landowners in mediations during this reporting period and none of these have been settled. Link to Right of Entry Order issued during this reporting period:

SRB ARBITRATIONS:

The FAO was not involved in any arbitrations during this reporting period.

NEB ARBITRATIONS (Natural Resources Canada):

 The FAO continues to assist landowners who have retained legal counsel to resolve a dispute over compensation for a NEB pipeline on his property. The negotiations are continuing.

OIL & GAS APPEAL TRIBUNAL:

- Elvin & Judi were observers only at portions of the OGAT hearing on September 12, 13 & 14 to appeal the decision of the BCOGC to issue well permits to Crew Energy Inc. The hearing was not finished in the 3 days allotted and 2 additional days have been scheduled for November 2 & 3.
- As reported on the previous quarterly report...

There appears to be confusion between the regulator and the Surface Rights Board regarding jurisdiction. Per the Oil & Gas Activity Application Manual, temporary workspace and sump are considered "associated oil and gas activities", and the OGC does not issue authorizations for associated oil and gas activities on private land. The SRB has taken the position that "the purpose of the sump is to facilitate construction of the pipeline, just as the purpose of temporary workspace is to facilitate construction of the pipeline, it is an oil and gas activity over which the Board has jurisdiction". The Board cannot have jurisdiction over unpermitted activities. The Board may grant a right of entry order conditional upon the person who is seeking the right of entry receiving approval from the commission as per Section 159 (3) of the Petroleum and Natural Gas Act.

Since the previous report, the company did not act on a SRB Right of Entry Order because, on reflection, they concluded they would not be in compliance with the "Drilling Waste Management" chapter of the BC Oil and Gas Handbook. Links to the 2 OGAT decisions regarding this situation:

OVERVIEW OF SUCCESSES

Oil and Gas Appeal Tribunal:

• Through the OGAT process, the FAO assisted local landowners prepare the paperwork for the appeal, as well as for a stay of the pipeline permit issued by the BC Oil and Gas Commission. The landowners have been granted a stay by the OGAT, which has been challenged by the oil and gas company. This is only the 2nd time in the history of the Oil and Gas Appeal Tribunal that a stay has been granted. The hearing is set for early December. Link to the Stay Application decision:

Failure to Pay

The FAO continues to be proactive in assisting landowners apply to the SRB for rent payments
that oil and gas companies are failing to make. Up to this point, it has only been landowners
with wells or facilities that were owned by Terra Energy that have been eligible to receive
compensation through the SRB.
